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## About the Institution

Regent University is the nation's academic center for Christian thought and action, with a multitude of on-campus and online programs available worldwide. Our academic standards for both our graduate and undergraduate programs are high and our programs rigorous. But what sets Regent apart is our mission to prepare capable men and women to excel both in mind and spirit. Our students, faculty and administrators share a calling, founded on biblical principles, to make a significant difference in our communities, our cities, our nation and our world.

## Leadership and Influence

When Dr. M.G. “Pat” Robertson established the university in 1978, he envisioned a high-caliber institution that would attract a leadership team brimming with superior professional experience and extraordinary academic credentials. In just three decades, that vision is being fulfilled. Distinguished faculty and guest lecturers include John Ashcroft, former U.S. Attorney General; Vern Clark, former Chief of Naval Operations; Steve Forbes, president and CEO of Forbes, Inc. and others.

Regent also exposes students to speakers who are front and center on some of the most important issues of our time. Nationally covered events such as Clash of the Titans®, The Ronald Reagan Symposium and Executive Leadership Series, allow students and the greater community to learn firsthand from major world and national leaders about today's most pressing issues.

The combination of committed leaders and diligent students has produced alumni who occupy strategic positions in a multitude of venues worldwide. They take seriously their call to lead and serve

others and excel in their professions, which include Virginia’s 71st Governor, Louisiana State Senator, National Middle School Principal of the Year, Hollywood screenwriters, National Milken Educator Award Winner and Assistant Secretary of Labor.

## History and Location

The university was founded for the specific purpose of preparing leaders who would not only succeed in their professions, but also advance as Christians equipped to effectively impact their world. In 1977, CBN University was incorporated as a nonprofit educational institution in Virginia Beach, Virginia. In the fall of 1978, 77 students began classes in modest, rented facilities. By October 1989, CBN University had grown from a School of Communication and the Arts to seven professional schools with nearly 800 students. On January 1, 1990, in recognition of this growth, the Board of Trustees voted to change the name of CBN University to Regent University. The university has grown to approximately 9,000 students earning associate’s, bachelor’s, master’s, and doctoral degrees at our Virginia Beach campus or via online learning.

**Academic Schools:** Regent University is comprised of eight schools: Business and Leadership; Communication and the Arts; Divinity; Education; Government; Law; Psychology and Counseling; and the College of Arts and Sciences.

## Regent Timeline

The Regent Timeline emphasizes the university's steady growth since those humble beginnings, as well as its commitment to academic excellence. Highlights from the beginning to today include:

### 1977

The university is incorporated as CBN University, a nonprofit graduate education institution.

### 1978

Dr. M.G. "Pat" Robertson is officially appointed president of, then, CBN University.

Students in the School of Communication & the Arts begin classes in September.

### 1980

The first class graduates in May.

The School of Education opens in October.

The university dedicates its first building, the Administration Building, on campus in Virginia Beach.

### 1982

Ground is broken for the University Library.

The School of Business and the School of Divinity open.

### 1983

Robertson School of Government opens.

### 1984

The university receives full accreditation from the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS).

### 1986

Regent University School of Law opens.

### 1988

The School of Psychology & Counseling is founded.

### 1990

The Board of Trustees votes to change the name of CBN University to Regent University.

### 1995

Regent opens its Washington, D.C., location.

### 1997

The School of Leadership Studies develops an online M.A. program in Organizational Leadership, marking Regent as a model for online graduate education.

### 2000

An undergraduate degree-completion program is introduced to

give working adults opportunities to complete bachelor's degrees in an accelerated format.

### **2002**

The 135,000-square-foot Communication & Performing Arts Center opens as one of the most technologically advanced communication buildings on the East Coast.

### **2003**

The 31,000-square-foot Student Center opens on campus in Virginia Beach, offering a close sense of community.

Regent celebrates 25 years of growth and influence with the kick-off of the Clash of the Titans® debate series.

### **2006**

Regent creates its School of Global Leadership & Entrepreneurship, the result of combining its School of Leadership Studies and School of Business.

### **2007**

Regent Law produces the winning team of the American Bar Association's 2007 Negotiation Competition, succeeding Harvard.

### **2008**

Regent celebrates its 30th anniversary. The School of Undergraduate Studies launches Regent's first associate degree programs.

### **2011**

Regent Law celebrates its 25th anniversary. Supreme Court Justice Samuel Alito visits campus to commemorate the milestone.

### **2012**

Regent University's Board of Trustees approves the name change of the School of Undergraduate Studies to College of Arts & Sciences. Likewise, the School of Global Leadership & Entrepreneurship is renamed School of Business & Leadership.

### **2013**

The 22,000-square-foot Chapel and connecting 36,000-square-foot Divinity Building open, providing a unifying venue where students, faculty, staff and the community can experience the presence of God as well as classrooms, offices and a welcome center.

### **2014**

Regent opens its first science laboratory to support a new degree in Biophysical Sciences, marking the university's entry into deeper study of the natural and physical sciences.

### **2015**

Regent's 20,000th graduate crosses the stage at Commencement on May 9, 2015.

Regent Law's Moot Court program ranks in the Top 10 nationally.

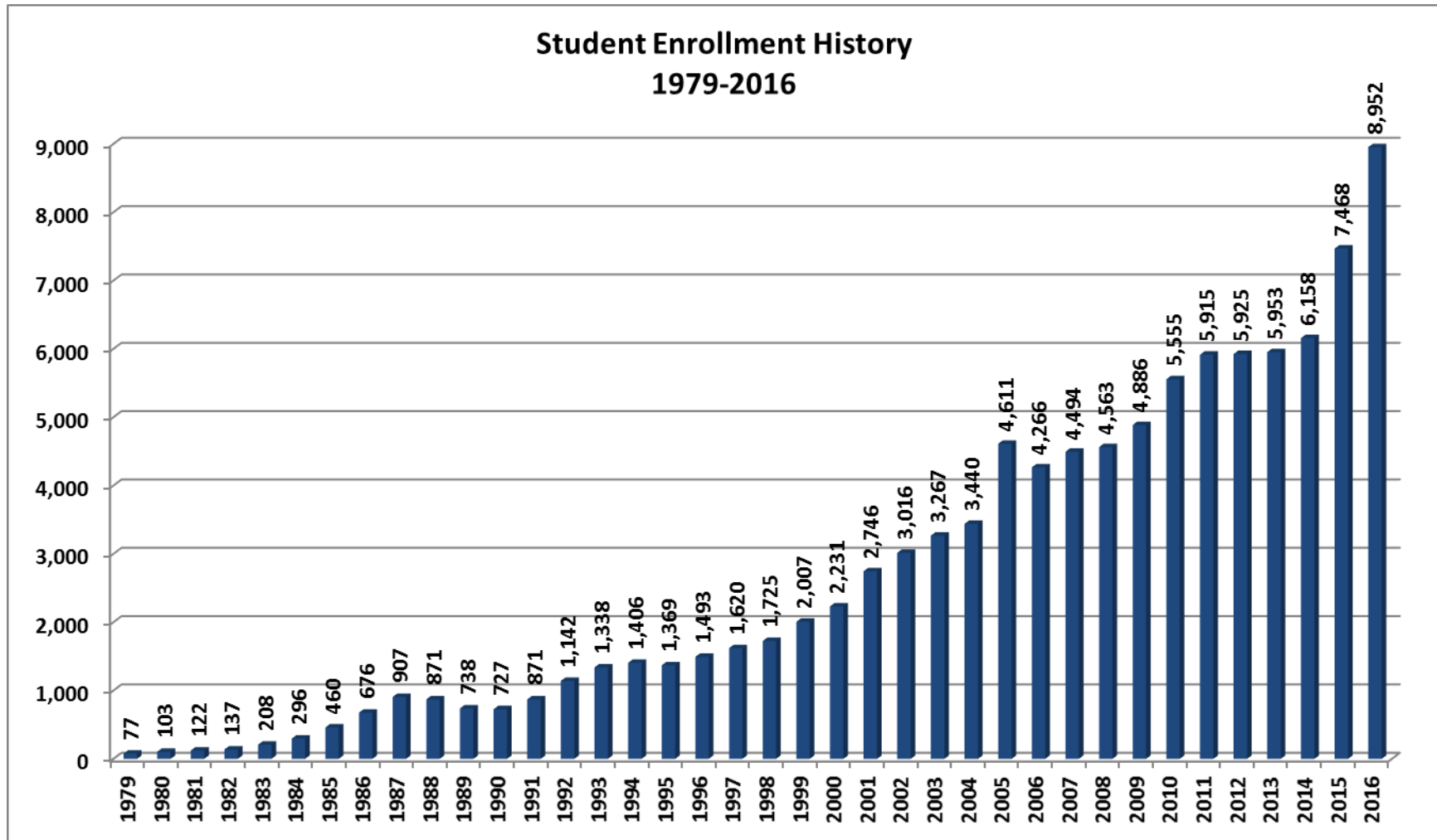

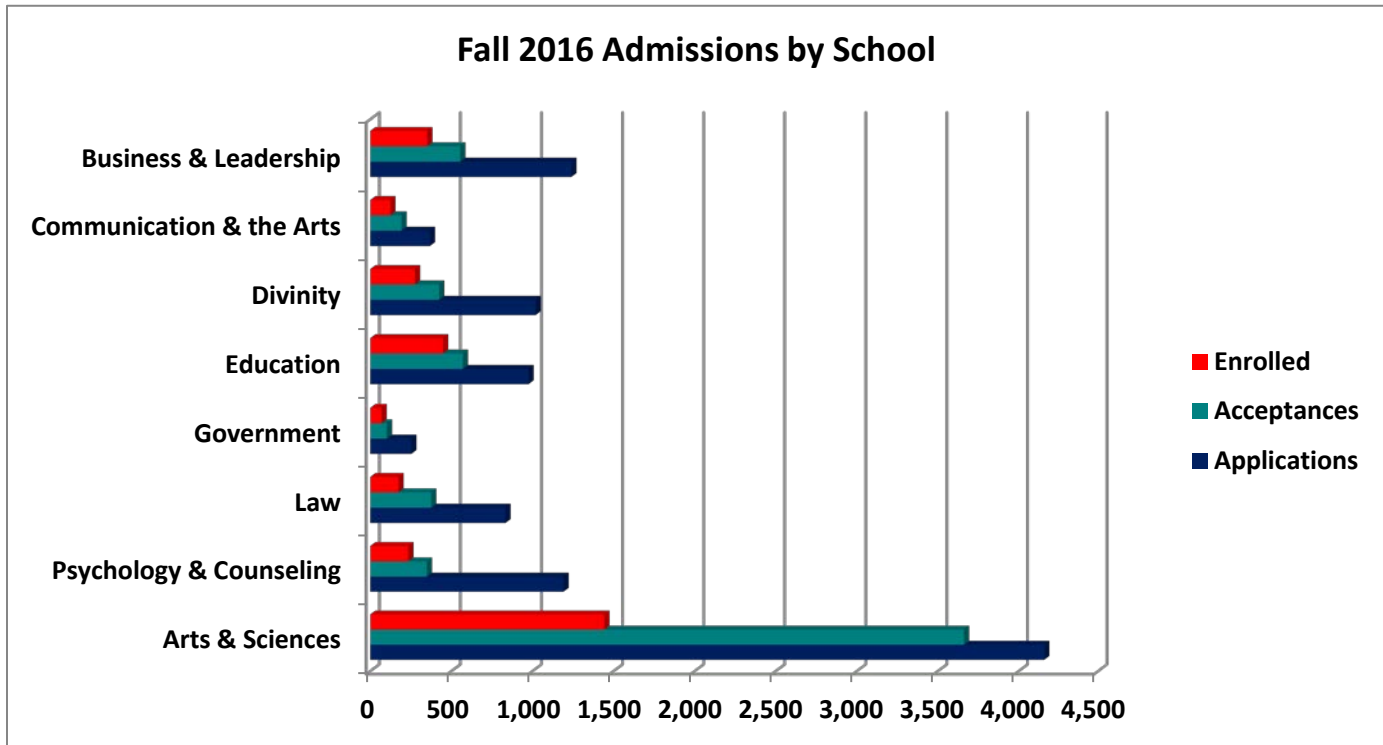
### Student Enrollment Fall Terms 1979-2016





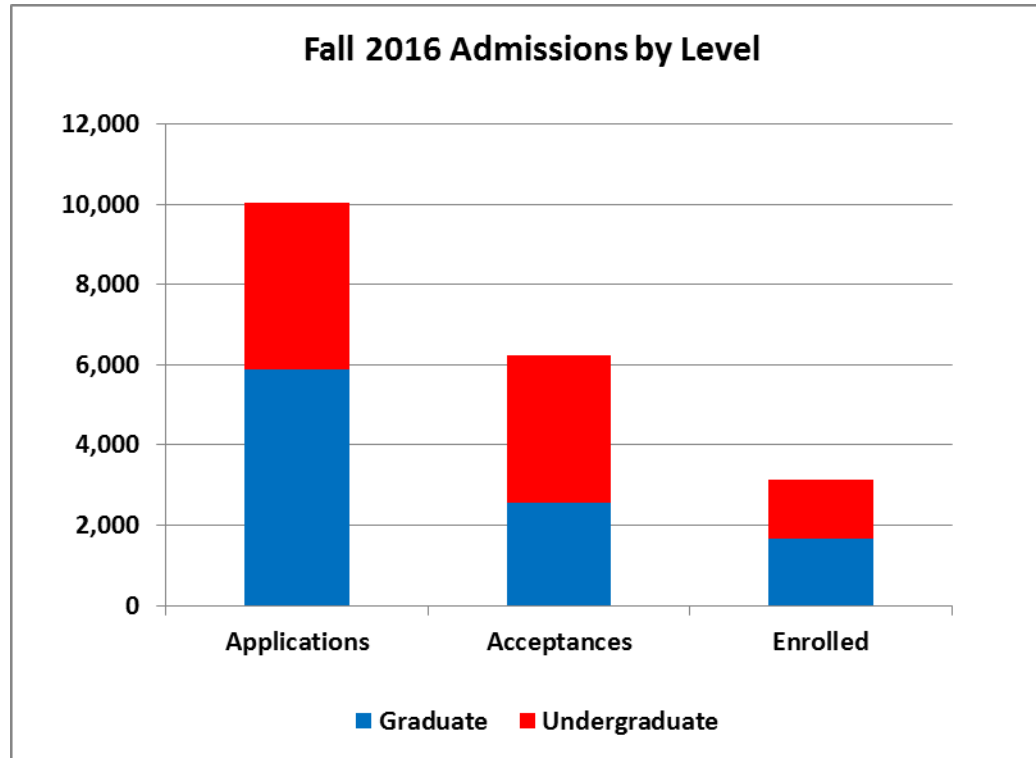

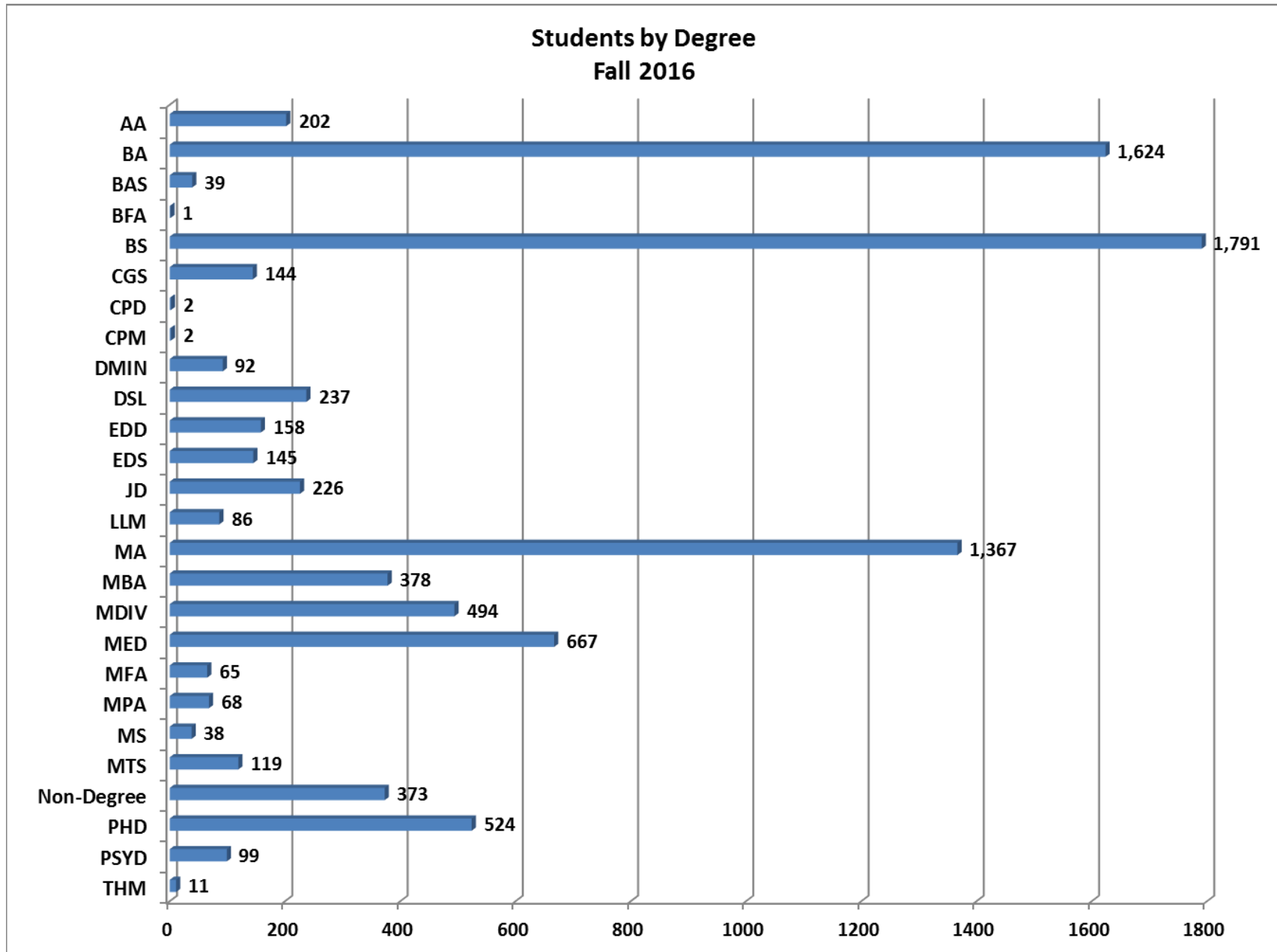

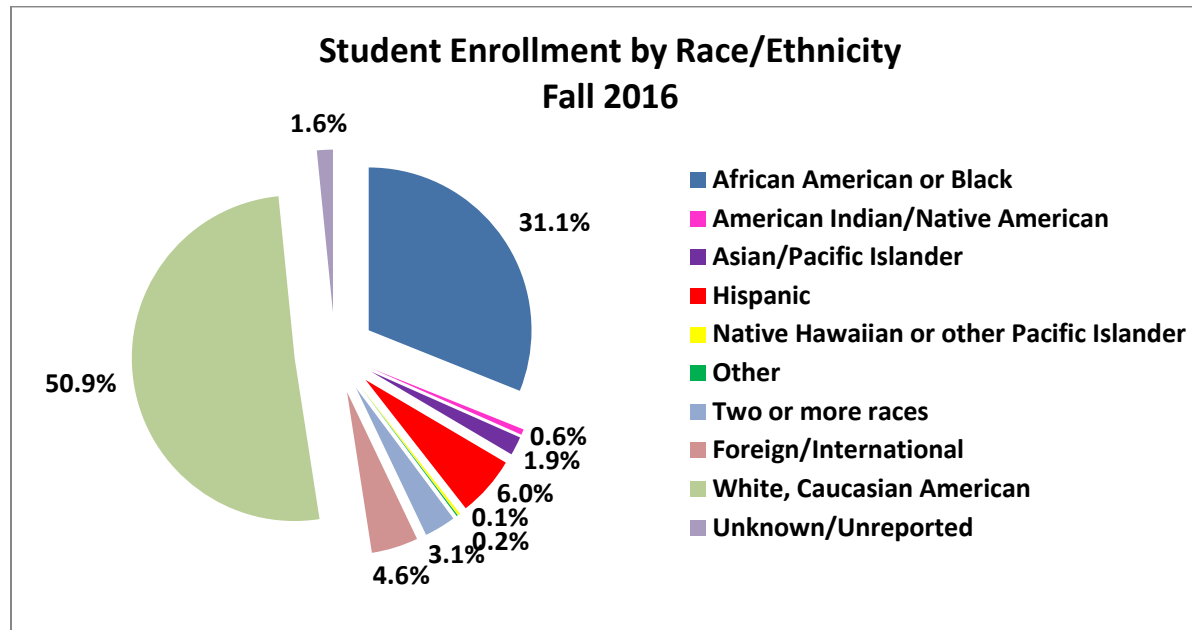

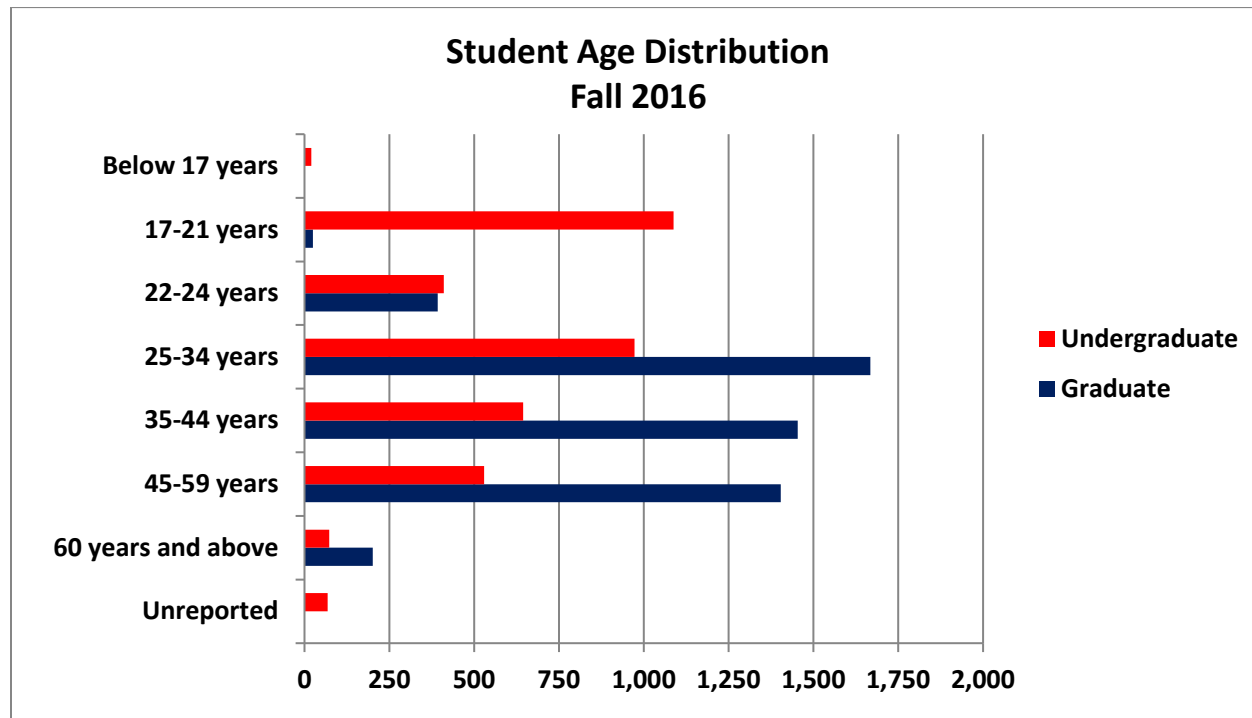

## Regent University Facilities

Regent University's Virginia Beach Campus sits on 70 acres of immaculately maintained grounds that complement the Georgian architecture of its buildings which are historic in design yet incorporate the latest educational technology.

- **The University Library**, with access to over 593,000 microforms and 25,500 audiovisual items offers numerous online subscription services and resources, providing a nearly limitless research environment. The building also houses Regent Law Library, administrative offices, student computer labs, the university's copy services center and mail services.



- **Robertson Hall** is equipped with the latest technology in audio/video equipment and cameras for simultaneous broadcasting. The 132,000-square-foot building also boasts a 380-seat moot court/city



council chamber and several classrooms. The building houses the schools of Government, Law and the College of Arts & Sciences.

- **The Communication & Performing Arts Center**, home for the **School of Communication & the Arts**, is a 135,000-square-foot building that features a 700+ seat theatre. The center also houses a 200-seat experimental theatre, cinema-television production studio, film sound stage, screening theaters, technical studios, classrooms and teaching labs. A back lot area offers space for sets for indoor and outdoor filming.
- **The Student Center** is a 31,000-square-foot facility housing student organization offices, The Ordinary dining facility, a computer lab, a student lounge and meeting rooms.



- **The Founders Inn and Spa**, located adjacent to the university campus, hosts a number of university events.
- The university also includes the **Administration Building**, utilized for the **School of Education** and administrative offices; and the **Classroom Building**, utilized for the schools **Business & Leadership** and **Psychology & Counseling**.



- **The Chapel & Divinity Building** are the centerpiece of campus life, providing a unifying venue where people can experience the presence of God. The Chapel features a 1,000-seat sanctuary for services, convocations, commencements, weddings and baptisms, as well as for individual reflection and prayer. A smaller prayer room is open around the clock for prayer, Bible studies and devotions. Connected to the Chapel by a covered walkway, the Divinity Building houses the Welcome Center, equipped to provide prospective students with admissions guidance, facilitate campus tours, and answer

visitor inquiries. Classrooms, meeting spaces, academic advisors, and offices for the School of Divinity are also here.

**Regent Village**—Open to graduate students with families, Regent Village consists of more than 200 two- and three-bedroom apartments located less than one mile from campus.

**Regent Commons**—Open to undergraduate and graduate students without children. This facility is located on-campus and provides a wide range of apartment styles.

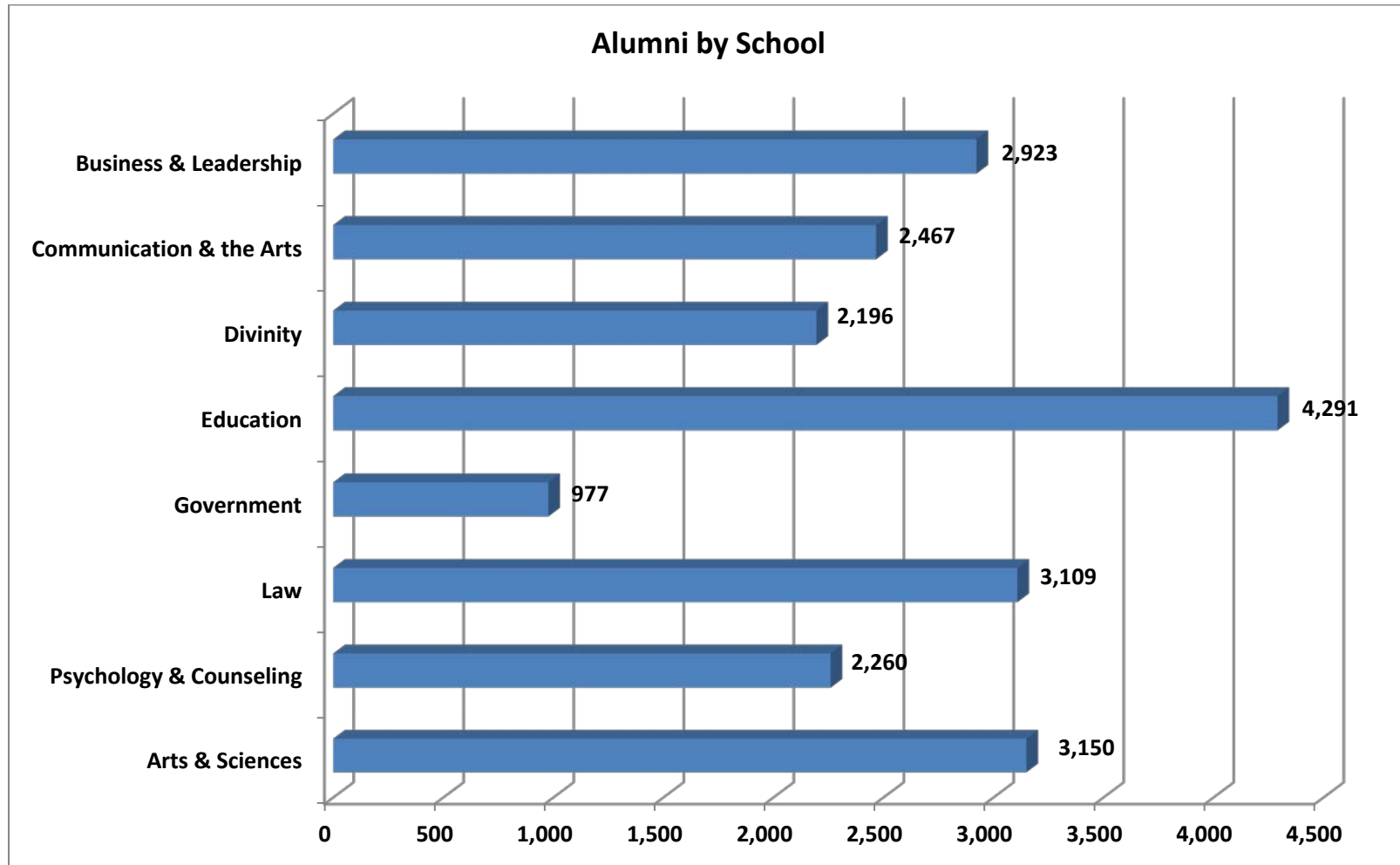
